

Anime Comes of Age: The History of Japanese Animation, 1980-Present with Joshua Frydman

In 1979, Mobile Suit Gundam and The Rose of Versailles proved that Japanese animated television series could work as entertainment for adult audiences as well as children. As appreciation of what animation could do spread in the high-speed economy of 1980's Japan, new genres and forms of anime were developed. Out of this explosion of animation came some of the powerhouse directors, writers and animation studios that would go on to change not only Japanese popular culture, but that of the entire world over the next few decades. Following on last year's talk about the origins of anime, this presentation looks at how and why Japanese animation became a worldwide phenomenon, and what led to the current styles and titles that remain popular today.

Joshua Frydman is Associate Professor of Japanese at the University of Oklahoma. A scholar on ancient Japan, his interests include the development of writing systems in East Asia and worldwide. He is the author of *The Japanese Myths: a Guide to Gods, Spirits and Heroes and Inscribed Objects and the Development of Literature in Early Japan.*


Viet Thanh Nguyen is the author of *The Sympathizer*, which won the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction. His other books are Nothing Ever Dies: Vietnam and the Memory of War, and Race and Resistance: Literature and Politics in Asian America. He is the Aerol Arnold Chair of English, and a Professor of English, American Studies and Ethnicity, and Comparative Literature at the University of Southern California. Minnie Phan is an illustrator and writer based in Oakland. Her work has been featured by Google, the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, and the San Francisco Public Library.

Against Time: Isamu Noguchi's Museum Experiment with Matthew Kirsch

In 1985, American-born artist Isamu Noguchi opened his namesake museum in a renovated photoengraving factory across the street from his longtime studio in Long Island City. The experimental move was Noguchi's rebuttal to the art museum environment he had grown critical of during his career, and a counter to the numerous museums that had asked him to consider making gifts. The museum's origins will be discussed in the context of *Against Time: The Noguchi Museum 40th Anniversary Reinstallation*, an adapted reinstallation of the second floor galleries, which opens on September 10, 2024. Within these galleries, Noguchi paired a selection of sculptures from the 1920s through the early 1970s with project models related to his various completed and unrealized public commissions for gardens, plazas, playgrounds, fountains and monuments, an area of his practice that was relatively unsung in 1985. Through the lens of the reinstallation, we can explore Noguchi's art, the choices he made about its display and the museum's ongoing work in ensuring his legacy.

Matthew Kirsch is Curator and Director of Research at The Noguchi Museum, where he is involved with exhibitions, public programs, publications, and editorial projects. He has been a major contributor to internationally renowned exhibitions and monographs.

Indonesia's Indigenous Textiles with Jean Howe & William Ingram

Come explore and enjoy a presentation by Jean Howe and William Ingram, cofounders of Threads of Life, an Indonesian social enterprise since 1998, on how to sustain Indonesia's indigenous textile traditions in the 21st century. Threads of Life works directly with over 1000 women weavers in more than 35 groups on 12 Indonesian islands to build livelihoods, empower women, revitalize indigenous culture, and conserve dye plant ecologies. Their textile and basket products can be seen on their website and in retail galleries in Bali.

After meeting in Tokyo and living in Japan for 5 years, Jean Howe and William Ingram moved to Bali in 1993 and started leading cultural tours to weaving communities through the 1990s. During the Southeast Asian economic crisis of 1998, they started <u>Threads of Life</u> to support textile culture, address the poverty caused by the economic crisis, and to facilitate the continuation of natural dye traditions. The organization has grown to employ 40 people, with Jean developing a deep knowledge of Indonesia's textile heritage and William exploring the natural dye arts and dye plant cultivation.

Fall 2024 Literature Course In Pursuit of Qu Yuan (343-277 BCE) with Paula Varsano

The name Qu Yuan (alternately written, Ch'ü Yuan) can provoke a range of responses, from admiration and compassion to exasperation and even disdain. Was he a wise and upright minister in the court of King Huai of Chu, who ended his life upon realizing that he was unable to save the kingdom from being overcome by the neighboring state of Qin? Or was he a man obsessed with the need to make known—and preserve—his own moral purity in the face of the corrupt and violent world of the Warring States? A supremely disciplined truth-teller or an unhinged madman? A statesman or a shaman? Patriot or narcissist? Or, as certain scholars have been wondering of late: did such a man ever exist? This short course on the great statesman and poet of the fourth century BCE will offer a window onto the history, legend, poetry, and cultural responses that comprise his complicated legacy, well beyond the festivals and traditional dishes that endure in popular culture.

Each class will be prefaced by a brief lecture introducing the historical background of particular facets of the Qu Yuan story, the salient aesthetic features of the texts in question, and the key debates that have exercised readers in modern and contemporary times. Each presentation will be followed by a guided conversation as, together, we engage in close readings of the works that have been passed down to us, raising our own queries and questions along the way. (Note: Attendees who have competency in the reading of Classical Chinese may request these texts in the original.)

Paula Varsano

Paula Varsano, Professor of Chinese Literature at the University of California, Berkeley, earned a B.A. in East Asian Studies at Yale University and a PhD in Chinese Literature at Princeton University. She specializes in classical Chinese poetry and thought from the 3rd through the 11th centuries, with particular interest in the intersections between Chinese literary practice and philosophical notions of the self. Selected book publications include *Tracking the Banished Immortal: The Poetry of Li Bo and its Critical Reception* (University of Hawaii Press, 2003), *In Praise of Blandness (the English translation of François Jullien's Éloge de la fadeur, Zone Books, 2004), and The Rhetoric of Hiddenness in Traditional Chinese Culture* (SUNY, 2016). She is currently completing work on the book, *Knowing and Being Known: The Lyric Subject in Traditional Chinese Poetry and Poetics.*
